

The Importance of Thanksgiving and Lamentation

As I sit to write this article, I have been reflecting on the good and sad things that surround us at the moment.

One of the things we have used in Messy Church and all age worship has been a gathering of items for prayers, after asking the question, what happy things have happened and what sad things have happened this month?

It seems that in the last few months, we have had a number of sad things to contend with. We've had computer, projection, building problems, we've seen some fallings out, and we've seen a number of our folk suffering with health issues. Some of these things will have made us confused, angry, or caused us pain, grief and even some doubts.

When I used to work in an engineering office, we would often gather in the kitchen and have a good moan while making tea and coffee. A good corporate moan! We'd let it all out, and decide who it was who was to blame for whatever had gone wrong, and have a good moan. Sometimes, getting these things off your chest makes you feel a lot better, sometimes it clears the air and allows you to get on with things, or move on.

In the church, perhaps we think we always need to grin and bear it, keep smiling and pretend there is nothing wrong. BUT! This is not biblical. Read the Psalms, read Lamentations and you can see how they often had a good moan. Best of all, look to see who they moaned to! They moaned and groaned about and to God.

I did wonder what the point of Lamentations and some of these Psalms was. But, I know from experience that having a good moan works for me. Is it wrong? I suppose it depends on who you do the moaning to, and for what purpose. If the purpose is to destroy, to bring down, or gossip, or to denigrate someone, then it is wrong. If the purpose is to find a way out, to seek a solution, to resolve, to find a different way of doing things, or a different way of understanding things, then perhaps moaning or lamenting could be a good thing.

When you read the lamenting psalms, after the psalmist has had a good lament, then there often seems to be something positive that comes out of it, often a recollection of God's promises and faithfulness.

Why do we feel better when we've had a moan? Is it because we've got this thing, this bottled up anxiety, angst, worry, anger, frustration off our chest? Have we 'named' it, so now we can work on dealing with it? Is it through putting it into words to explain it to someone else that we finally begin to understand it ourselves? Is it the sharing of it with someone else that makes it easier? A problem shared is a problem halved? Or is it all of these things?

Take a look at Lamentations chapter 3 -

1 I am one who has seen affliction under the rod of God's wrath;
 ² he has driven and brought me into darkness without any light;
 ³ against me alone he turns his hand,

again and again, all day long.

 ⁴ He has made my flesh and my skin waste away, and broken my bones;
 ⁵ he has besieged and enveloped me with bitterness and tribulation;

⁶ he has made me sit in darkness like the dead of long ago.

This is a really good moan, and yet if you read on, once he gets this off his chest he realises:-

²² The steadfast love of the LORD never ceases, his mercies never come to an end;

²³ they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness.

24 'The LORD is my portion,' says my soul, 'therefore I will hope in him.'

Then he gives thanks to God for all he has been given.

So, if you are feeling a bit down, if things are getting on top of you, then follow the biblical pattern, speak to God in prayer, describe the suffering or anguish that you need relief from, ask God for help, ask God to deal with those who have caused your grief or pain, advise God of your innocence, or confess what you have done wrong, wait on the Lord's response and then give thanks. (You will see a similar pattern in Psalms 3 & 44).

We also have a great deal to give thanks for. We've had a donation from Thorpe Bay towards our repairs. We are seeing increasing numbers of parents and toddlers coming to Brightstars. We've completed our lighting project. We've had the finial repaired. We've had some excellent worship and fellowship over Easter. Our puppeteers and young people did very well at "Worship for All". We are even

Minutes of Meeting held on the Day of Pentecost.

secret ballot. After some discussion it was decided:

Simon Peter in the Chair.

Welcome and Apologies for absence.

The Chairman welcomed Matthias to the meeting as the elected successor to the late Judas Iscariot. There were no apologies for absence. It was asked from the floor of the meeting whether Matthias' appointment was a three-year appointment and whether further elections would be held by lot or

- 1. That as the other disciples were appointed for no fixed period Matthias' appointment should be the same.
- 2. The method of election to fill further vacancies: method of election, and period of appointment should be discussed at the next meeting.
- 3. None of the other disciples wished to retire at the moment.

Matters Arising: It was suggested that John Mark be questioned about his conduct at the arrest of Jesus. It was further suggested that his membership be discontinued. It was stated that when Jesus was arrested John Mark ran away naked. This disturbed some members of the crowd particularly a few of the old ladies. John Mark said in his defence that this was a one off experience and that he was not in the habit of running about naked. His mother could vouch for that. He apologised to the meeting. His apology was accepted; 34 in favour 12 against. It was recommended that he receive counselling and this be offered to the disturbed old ladies as well.

Finance and General Purposes: It was suggested from the floor that the upper room where the meeting was being held was rather draughty. There was in fact a strong breeze blowing. The Chairman of the General Purposes Committee said that he would investigate the matter. Finances were tight but he would get quotations and arrange any necessary repairs. This was accepted by the meeting after further discussions on the desirability of double-glazing and under floor heating. It was also suggested that there was an electrical fault because there appeared to be sparks coming from the floorboards and other parts of the room that might be a fire hazard. It was agreed that this also should be looked into and the fire regulations checked.

Communications: The Chairman proposed that the members of the meeting communicate their thoughts and experiences about Jesus to the people in the streets of Jerusalem. After some discussion it was decided that this was not feasible for the following reasons:

- 1. People in Jerusalem spoke a variety of languages.
- 2. Members were not trained in public speaking.
- 3. No permission from the local authorities.
- 4. What they said might upset some people.

It was agreed that a small subcommittee look into the suggestion and report back in six months' time.

The following guidelines were suggested for the subcommittee:

- 1. Permission is sought from the local authorities.
- 2. The possibility of language courses at the local college is explored.
- 3. A course in public relations and race relations is undertaken.
- 4. The cost would also have to be carefully considered. The feasibility of a weekend away to discuss these proposals was also discussed. The Chairman would convene a subcommittee.

Other Matters:

The Chairman thanked Martha and Mary for providing coffee and biscuits.

The Chairman closed the meeting, as there was no other business.

Keep Sunday Special

As some of you may remember, I was a supporter of the Keep Sunday Special Campaign, which sought to bring to the public's attention the effect that the proposed Deregulation of Sunday Trading would have on their lives.

Despite a hard campaign to seek support from various organisations, including the churches, the Bill received enough votes in the Commons for the Bill to go forward and finally received Assent and became the Sunday Trading Act 1994. The only concession in the Bill was that multiple stores and supermarkets and garden centres over 3000 square feet would be restricted to six hours on Sundays and also to be closed on Easter Sundays.

As a result of the Bill becoming law, we have all seen the effect on our Sundays, which are no longer peaceful, and must have disrupted family life. In order that the reader may fully understand the K.S.S. arguments opposing any further Deregulations, I am printing below their points from the circular that I have received.

" * Once again we are appealing to the supporters of the Keep Sunday Special Campaign in face of a new threat to partially, or completely, deregulate Sunday trading in England and Wales. The news that Philip Davies MP, vice chairman of the parliamentary Retail Group, intends to table a series of amendments to the Deregulation Bill currently going through Parliament has stirred up a lot of interest in the press and local radio to which we are contributing vigorously. The Keep Sunday Special Campaign is utterly opposed to the proposed changes and is ready for the work which will be needed when the debate occurs in Parliament, briefing all MPs in advance and making sure that the arguments are heard across the media.

The present position is this: Asda and Morrisons have told government ministers that they now want the 2012 temporary 'Olympic Games' extra opening hours to be made permanent. B & Q are said to be supportive but are not actively campaigning at the moment, while the Home Retail Group (Homebase, Argos and Habitat) are opposed, as are Sainsbury's and Waitrose.

Alongside this, a new campaign, Open Sundays, has been launched which is encouraging consumers to make their voice heard: "We want to shop on Sundays when we want and where we want." It is vital that MPs and the press know that the majority of people value Sunday as a special day and do not want further deregulation.

There are four dangerous myths of the Sunday Spoilers that we need to expose both in this context and more broadly.

MYTH 1: That Sunday trading is about unnecessary and oppressive regulation. Simply not true. We believe that Sunday is a special day because people want a day with a different character and shared time for family and community life. A real 24-7 society would mean that all days were the same. Moreover, we have already seen this argument off during the early days of the coalition government. In 2011 KSS and others put up a determined resistance to attempts to deregulate Sundays under the terms of the 'Red Tape Challenge', a formal consultation process, which concluded that there was no real demand or support for change.

MYTH 2: That further deregulation simply allows "freedom of choice". People are already pressured to work on Sundays and can be penalised if they refuse to take jobs requiring Sunday work. Current employment protection is limited and ineffective. Parents of school-age children, who work weekends, and particularly Sundays, do not make up the time with children during the week. Shops will be under pressure to match their competitors' opening hours, spreading the same sales over a longer period. Deregulation would, in fact, remove choices for many people.

MYTH 3: That the 'Olympic Sundays' legislative concession was a success in trading terms. It wasn't and it's surely for those advocating change to highlight the evidence which shows that the temporary suspension of Sunday trading regulations for eight weeks in the summer of 2012 actually resulted in a drop in business not an increase! And there is also absolutely no evidence that people have money burning a hole in their pockets which they long to spend on Sundays.

MYTH 4: Raising the apparently 'better position' in Scotland in this context, as our opponents do, is yet another own goal. Witness the Sunday Working (Scotland) Act 2003 which followed Argos sacking people for refusing to work on Sunday in 2002. The trade unions successfully contested this and Argos backtracked. Subsequently an Act was passed by Parliament protecting the employment rights of workers north of the border so that they have the right to opt out of Sunday working. The unwelcome pressure to work on Sundays, to the detriment of family and community life, is as much an issue in Scotland as anywhere else.

We must also note from recent press reports (in, for example, the Daily Telegraph) that Asda and Morrisons are losing market share, which may well have some relevance here. So, instead, we must ensure that the words of highly successful retailers who see the bigger picture and who can take the longer view are widely heard. Justin King, chief exec of Sainsbury's recently said "Our customers aren't asking for it. I've never had a letter from a customer saying, 'Please campaign for longer opening hours on Sunday'. The compromise that has been reached is, essentially, "to keep Sunday special". Bravo! And Sir Stuart Rose, former M & S Chairman added: "The fact of the matter is you simply spread the same amount of business over a longer period, but with more operating costs.

It's a zero sum game. Besides, if you can't do your shopping in the time already available, what hope is there!" We also look to the Prime Minster robustly to defend his position that we should become "most family friendly country in Europe" and that all policy should be subjected to a "family test".
