# **Easter Message from our Minister**

Dear Friends

As we approach Easter this year we reflect again on the mystery of God's love and forgiveness for each and every one of us.

So far this year, I have had to explain Easter to two sets of small children, and there is nothing like explaining things to small children to make you think about it in a different way.

At Hockley's Messy Easter, we did a walkthrough of the whole Easter Story from Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday in about 7 minutes. I heard myself telling the children, God sent his Son Jesus to tell people to be nice to each other, to care for each other, to love each other, no fighting, no hate, and no greed. We talked about how he was welcomed into Jerusalem, and we shouted Hosanna, and waved palm crosses as a Hobby Horse riding Jesus walked towards Jerusalem at the side of the church. We considered how some folk didn't like what Jesus was saying so they plotted to get rid of him.

It's not easy for any of us to deal with the Crucifixion and the death of Jesus, and I find this the hardest part of Easter. I know the theory, I know the Theology, I know it is part of God's plan for forgiveness but it's still hard to comprehend the cruelty meted out to Jesus, hard to comprehend that Jesus did this for me. So how do we cover the death of Jesus with small children in the story for Messy Church and for the Pre-school? In the end I choose to talk about Jesus' death without the mechanics of how it happened. I told them that people were very horrible to Jesus and he died. The young person playing Jesus lied down. It was very, very sad.

On Good Friday (God Friday), we need to spend some time in reflection on Jesus' death, we can't move straight to the joy and celebration of Resurrection and Easter Sunday, without reflecting on the passion, the pain and sacrifice of Good Friday. We will have a service at 3pm on Good Friday, when we can reflect on the story of Good Friday.

But the glory of Easter is that we move from sadness to happiness, as we enter Easter Sunday, and realise that Jesus is alive again, death has been defeated, and sin, guilt and shame have been wiped away, defeated. We can rejoice, we can celebrate.

In many ways Easter is better than Christmas, there is not so much pressure on us all to provide that perfect meal, or that perfect present, we can relax and enjoy this festival, and celebrate God's love for us.

Today our readings reminded all of us who are weary or heavy laden to come to Jesus and he will provide us with rest, as his yoke is easy and his burden is light. (Matthew 11.28-end). We are reminded that Jesus does not stand over us like a Policeman, or wag his finger at us like a stern school teacher. We are loved and valued; we are beautiful in his sight. There is no condemnation, just salvation. (John 3:16-17).

So let us reflect on Easter, and let us enjoy Easter, celebrate and rejoice in God's love and forgiveness.

# **Revd. Sam Connolly**

I was sorry to hear of the death of Sam Connolly on 31 January. Sam was our minister here from 1959 to 1966. He was invited to join the Leigh circuit with specific responsibility for the Methodist Churches at Hockley and Wickford. At that time the manse was almost opposite the Hockley church and Sam and his wife Gertie threw themselves into every facet of church activity. Largely through their efforts the congregation grew markedly but it was Sam's work with young people which still resonates. Sunday school numbers increased so rapidly that a new hall had to be built in haste on adjoining waste ground (now alas demolished to make way for the car park). Members may still remember his work with the uniformed organisations and especially the youth club, with regular Sunday evening meetings at the Manse after church and taking them on holiday, as far afield as Italy and Switzerland. He set up a cricket match between the youth club and senior members of the church. Out of that he encouraged a series of matches against local adult teams and this, in turn led to the formation of the 'Hockley Methodist Cricket Club', with Sam as President and captain in that first season. The Club won no matches at all that year but performances gradually improved and it played on for some 15 seasons until falling numbers led to an amalgamation with another local side. Sam himself was a bit of an all-rounder and would have a go at everything (except wicket-keeping).

When a group of church ladies suggested a Young Wives club, he responded by setting up a Married Couples Club, it being important as he saw it for husbands and wives to spend more time together. When problems were raised about their young children at home, he dealt with that by personally persuading older church members to provide a baby-sitting service. Out of that arrangement many lasting friendships between parents and baby-sitter were established. That Married Couples Club is still going strong, now in its 52nd year, although with the passage of time it naturally felt obliged to change its name to the Thursday Social Club so that all may be welcomed. Sam returned to Hockley for its 40th Anniversary in 2003 and it was on that occasion that I was persuaded (and Sam was always a very good persuader) to join the Pen and Camera Club, of which he was an extremely proud President as well as a very competent photographer. It was always a delight to meet him at Camera Club Reunions and to marvel at his prodigious memory for names, youngsters and adults alike, from his time in Essex. You may remember we showed a video of him in the church taken on his 90th birthday fulfilling a lifelong ambition to drive a double-decker bus!

Sam was well-known around Hockley and Hawkwell, meeting many as he walked his dog through the woods, visiting local community organisations or just popping to the shops. His preaching was meaningful; his views often forthright but put over in a way that did not cause offence. The President of the Brotherhood at the time once described him as another 'Lax of Poplar' and I think he would have been secretly pleased at that description. He played a good innings, passing away peacefully in Haywards Heath Hospital at the age of 96.

#### **Thursday Social Club**

We met at the home of Ian and Vivienne on Thursday 22nd January and were treated to a talk on their recent holiday to Vietnam.

Vietnam is a beautiful country that has been blighted by wars over many years. Fresh in a lot of westerner's minds is the battle with the Vietcong that culminated in the withdrawal of the Americans in 1975. Ian and Viv's holiday was booked with HF Holidays and has been used before as their organisation and guides are second to none.

Things have changed immensely since the Americans left Vietnam as tourism is increasing year by year. The largest city in Vietnam, Ho Chi Minh City (formerly known as Saigon), was the destination and on arrival the pace of the traffic was unbelievable. Cars were not the problem but the sight of motorbikes everywhere, speeding through the crowded streets.

A throwback to the days of the Vietcong could be found in many strange places. You could be walking along the street when you encounter a large underground tunnel that brought the Vietcong behind enemy lines to devastating effect. Temples could be found wherever you looked but surprisingly one of the most impressive was a Catholic church in the city.

In the U.K. there are decreasingly less purpose built post offices as the majority are now housed in pharmacies, newsagents or supermarkets. Not so in Vietnam, their post office was in the style of an impressively large railway station. A travel along the Mekong Delta gave a glimpse of the many waterside dwellings. Ho Chi Minh was the president of Vietnam from December 1954 to September 1969 and his influence could be seen throughout the city. A faraway country but in lan and Viv's talk it brought it much closer to home.

Thursday 5th February and we met at the home of Stan and Joyce for a talk on "Reporter's Ramblings" with Roger Buxton. To anyone who has met Roger before they will know that he does enjoy telling you one of his many anecdotes. His early experience was working for a local newspaper group as an inexperienced junior reporter before reaching the giddy heights of chief sports reporter. His love of music and talking to people brought him to Essex Radio where he met many well known faces from the world of sport and entertainment.

One of the most inspiring people he met was Helen Rollason MBE. Helen was a former supply teacher of PE who left the profession to join Channel 4. Sport was her greatest love and in 1990 she became the first female presenter of Grandstand. In 1996 she was named as Sports Presenter of the Year. In 1997 she was diagnosed with colon cancer and despite a brave fight she passed away in 1999. Helen lived in Brentwood and the Helen Rollason Cancer Trust has raised millions of pounds for this most deserving charity. A truly brave and

inspiring woman. We eventually had to call time on Roger as he launched into one more of his anecdotes. An evening with a difference from the man of many stories.

We used to meet in January for our annual social club lunch but a few years ago we moved it to February to escape the inclement weather regularly experienced in January. For the second year running we went to The Anchor at Danbury. Wednesday 11th February was the date for our dinner which, for the romantics among us, was three days before Valentines Day. En route we stopped off at The Meadowcroft nursery in Battlesbridge for teas and coffees and looked around at this delightful garden nursery. Suitably refreshed we set off for the short journey to The Anchor at Danbury. Most of us arrived fairly comfortably but it is not the easiest place to find for some people.

We all sat together on a long table in a corner of the restaurant and it was only a short wait before our orders were taken. The staff coped very well with our varied choices and despite the large helpings we found room for the very appetising desserts on offer. Teas and coffees followed before we made our way back to our cars for the short journey home.

Thursday 19th February we met at the church for a talk by Sarah Coyte-Broomfield which was originally to be called "Walking With Elephants." As very few elephants were encountered perhaps it should be re-titled "South Africa Expedition 2014." Mike is a very keen scuba diver and on reaching the Great Barrier Reef he was in seventh heaven. Muriel joined Mike in taking advantage of the warm clear waters in the area and some of their photos were amazing, displaying the many unusual fish and flora in the clear waters.

It was with a heavy heart when Mike and Muriel arrived back in the U.K. and our temperature of single figures.

# A Copy of Hannah Bucke's Report to the Circuit Meeting on 12<sup>th</sup> March

Town Centre Ministry – Hannah Bucke provided the following overview:-

She thanked all who took part in, came to watch, and prayed for the Christmas Flashmob. It was a wonderful event made possible by the cooperation of people from so many churches across the town. One of the highlights for Hannah was the way in which Christians from a wide variety of churches worked so well together to bless the people of the town centre. They were very fortunate to receive some very good coverage of the event from the Echo and a video of the event is on YouTube. The team was very grateful for the cooperation of Southend Council in allowing the event to go ahead.

Christmas Icons at the Royals was a great success and it had plenty of use. The Royals management were particularly pleased with how well it was received and would like to use it again next year. Hannah was grateful to Thorpe Bay who has stored it.

Easter Icons is nearly upon us and this year, the Icons team is breaking out into the High Street with the Easter Story. They will be placing 15 pieces of art around the town centre on some of the Easter themes. Final details will be sent to all churches but if you are in Southend during Holy Week, look out for art attached to railings, in planters, in the odd shop window and perhaps even on a bike somewhere!

Now that the 'Icons' team has worked together on Easter and Christmas Icons and the flashmob, they have decided to brand themselves 'Icons-on-Sea' so they can better publicise the work. The core Icons team consists of Rev Steve Tinning and David Elcock from Leigh Road Baptist Church and Rev Andy Goodliff from Belle Vue Baptist Church. Other key people include Peter Courtenay and Anne Briant from our circuit. They already have a facebook page and a website will follow soon.

One further recent development has been the invitation to Hannah to become the Chaplain to Adventure Island. They are one of the largest employers in the town, employing up to 1000 staff during the summer season and the vast majority of these are college and university students. Hannah has already been along to some of the new staff inductions and started to build relationships with the staff there now that they are open at weekends. She has been very well received so far and the management is actively encouraging staff to make use of this support. This is an exciting opportunity to engage with many young people in the town and with one of the town's most important businesses.

Finally Hannah would like to thank all of you who have supported her through candidating, training and probation. The District Probationers' Committee have recommended her for ordination at the Southport Conference this year and she is due to be ordained at Chester Cathedral on 28th June at 6.30 pm. She would love to have friends from across the circuit at this very special occasion. Please let her know if you would like tickets. Her testimony service will be at Wesley on 13th June, 7.30pm and again, she would love to see everyone there.

Please continue to keep the town centre ministry in your prayers - they are very much appreciated.

Hannah's Management Group noted that the Town Centre Ministry is one of the Circuit's priorities so this should steer future process regarding seeking funding for the role. The Circuit has agreed to continue funding a quarter stipend for the length of Hannah's time in post. She has found additional funding through the local Avenue Trust. Circuit Meeting endorsed and supported the proposal to establish the work as a project so that further District and other funding could be sought. A volunteer is needed to undertake the practical work, establish project papers and create the applications – freeing Hannah to use her skills for the ministry itself.
