

HAROLD COLLINGRIDGE

Dad made it very easy for us to compile a tribute to him as, amongst his effects, was this painstakingly typed account of his life in his own words. As always, it shows how organised and forward-thinking he was, so here it is:

Harold was born on 7th April, 1923 on Alderman's Hill, Hockley, where he lived with his parents. In 1927 they moved into the bungalow in Highams Road (and where Harold was to spend the majority of his life), which his father had had built when his mother was expecting their second child, Norman. During the next few years his brother had health problems relating to a blood condition, necessitating his mother having to take him to a London hospital frequently for treatment. Sadly, his brother died, aged three years, and is buried in St. Mary's Church in Hawkwell.

When Harold was five years of age he remembered his father bringing him to Sunday school here and he attended for some years after. He went to Hockley Primary School on the Main Road until he was eleven, subsequently attending Eton House School in Southend.

In 1937 his parents decided to move to a house in Highlands Boulevard, Leigh and let out the bungalow in Highams Road. As Harold was no longer at school he found a job with a department store – Gamages – in London. As the war was expected, his father's insurance firm in Cornhill evacuated to Littlehampton, his father renting a flat nearby. Subsequently the firm decided to move once more for safety and took offices in a large mansion called Naseby Hall in the Midlands. The family rented a house in a village nearby, but his mother decided that she could not live there and she and Harold moved back to Leigh-on-Sea, his father returning at weekends. Harold had to find a job and took a post with a local estate agent. His duties included collecting rents (**on his bike**).

In May 1942 he received his calling-up papers for the Royal Navy, which he was pleased about, having always loved the sea and ships. He attended the Signal School at Devonport, qualifying as a signalman after a 9-month course. He was drafted to an allied ship of the Royal **Norwegian** Navy as a liaison rating. The ship was operating as escort in the waters of the Atlantic, Orkneys, Shetland and the Faroe Islands.

On one occasion, whilst on leave, he visited a dance hall in Westcliff and learnt that **Jean Andrews**, who had lived near him in Hockley, sometimes attended the hall. On his next leave he met her and found that she now lived in Prittlewell. They kept in touch and were together whenever he managed to get leave.

On the 8th May 1945 his ship, together with others, took part in the liberation of Norway in Bergen. After spending five months in Norway he was drafted back to England, and was demobbed in 1946. Subsequently he obtained a post with a firm of Valuers and Estate Agents in Chalkwell.

He was able to spend more time with Jean and at Christmas 1947 they became engaged and were married at St. Mary's Church, Prittlewell on 24th July 1948. They lived for a while with Harold's parents until renting three rooms in Bull Lane, Rayleigh. In January 1950 they moved to a flat in Prittlewell when Jean was expecting their first child, **Susan**. They lived there until 1955, during which time their son **Martin** was also born. They moved to a house in Henley Crescent, Westcliff, but when in 1959 Harold's father died, his mother did not wish to stay in the bungalow at Highams Road, where they had returned to after the war. The family decided to move into there themselves in December 1959.

On returning to our church in 1960, Harold learned that the 1st Hockley Scout Troop was looking for a new leader, as the then Scoutmaster was retiring. He agreed to take over on a temporary basis until a new Leader could be found, which happened some time later, namely Derek Evans. Harold remained as Assistant Scout Leader for some years after.

Early in the sixties one of the stewards of this church, Mr. E. Deedman, -**Michael's** father - told Harold they were looking for another door steward for evening services and Harold agreed to accept this duty, which he carried out for approximately fifty years.

In 1967 they were blessed with another child, who they named **David**.

Harold continued working in Chalkwell until the office had to close in 1984. He immediately obtained another position with a firm of Chartered Surveyors – Rona's in Rayleigh – which he enjoyed until retiring in April 1988, but returning part time for 6 months.

Harold and Jean enjoyed many holidays in the UK and Europe. He also had a long-awaited nostalgic return to Norway in 1988 with Jean, visiting one of his Norwegian shipmates, Rolf Dahl in Oslo.

There Dad's account ends, with the words "to be continued", and we all know he went on to have a very full, happy life with our Mum until she passed away nearly five years ago. Life since then was very challenging at times, but he faced it all with quiet humour and strong faith and determination; right until the end. We, as a family, have always been very proud to call him our Dad and Grandad and know that his life **is** "To be continued". **Susan, Harold's daughter**

. Revd. Brian Gameson's Memories of Harold

I understand that a few years after leaving the Navy Harold received a letter from Oslo informing him that the Norwegian Naval command had awarded him The War Medal with certificate and Norwegian Service Medal and certificate for service in the Royal Norwegian Navy. How proud you will be of him. It is always inspiring to learn of the experiences of someone we have known for years yet has not talked about them himself.

I remember well from my time here how faithfully Harold carried out his duties as Assistant Scout Master. He was regular too serving as Steward at our evening services and also as our Home Missions Representative. In 1983, at the time of the Centenary of Hockley Methodist Church, he was the Church's Press Officer. He was very concerned with the campaign to "Keep Sunday Special" and on its behalf wrote many letters.

In later years he was a loyal supporter of the Tuesday Fellowship and Bible Study and subsequently of the Wednesday Afternoon Bible Study. When later he was in the Residential Home in Ashingdon he looked forward to the same group, led by Revd. Phil Warrey, visiting him there and sharing communion.

Phil telephoned me with the following message:

"I will long remember Jean and Harold. They were stalwarts of our evening services at Hockley. When I arrived in September 2012 I'd walked to the Church with them, it was a short while before Jean died and she was so tired. Harold missed her desperately. They were so in love, and it's good to think of them reunited.

A visit to Harold at his cottage was a treat, small cakes would be lined up beautifully on a plate and a cup and saucer brought in. He was a gentleman of the first order and he bravely soldiered on, not wanting to tell us he wasn't well. Still coming to church whenever he could, I I remember us having a Chinese evening and he thought he would not come as he had never had Chinese. I said to him: "It's about time you did" and he smiled his amazing smile and decided he would come. I will treasure the gift he gave me of a small communion plate.

Lord I warmly commend to you my friend Harold who loved You and Jean and his family of whom he spoke warmly and proudly.

We will all have our memories of Harold as a loving caring Father and Grandfather. All who knew him described Harold as "a lovely man and a true gentleman" which is not surprising for his Christian faith shaped his life. Today we rejoice in a life well lived and that now he is reunited with Jean in God's presence. For as St. Paul wrote, "I am sure that neither death nor life nor anything else will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8).


