



From the Worship Team

There has certainly been a variety of services over the last few months, culminating in Rev Michael Moon’s spectacular walk through Summer for Youth Weekend, so a big thank you to all those who have worked hard to prepare and present Worship in a variety of styles.

The next few months will have Harvest Parade led by Bob and Anne Briant, a return visit by Sue Hockett and her husband Steve for November’s AAW, Remembrance Sunday led by Carolyn and Anne, then the Toy and Gift Parade led by Rev Michael Moon marking the beginning of Advent. In between Michael will be taking a regular Communion service on the fourth Sunday of the month. Revd. House of Thrones

No, this isn't meant to be the popular Game of Thrones. The title is a bit misleading as it is really about a palace and a throne. A golden throne at that.

As many of you know, I am an avid football fan following the fortunes (or not) of Billericay Town Football Club along with son and daughter, David and Caroline. When the fixtures come out in July the date of Saturday 14th September got my attention. Billericay Town were away to Oxford City. With this in mind I decided to book a weekend away to visit Blenheim Palace and the university city of Oxford. I booked a guest house in Woodstock which was just a few minutes walk away from the Blenheim estate.

I arrived at Woodstock on the Friday at midday and booked into my guest house before setting out for the nearby Palace. After a ten minute walk I entered the vast expanse of Blenheim Park. It was a lovely day with clear blue skies and golden sunshine. Here I go mentioning gold again. I warn you, it will be repeated.

I strolled around a beautiful lake within the grounds before the magnificent building that is Blenheim Palace came into view. As I entered the vast building the smell of fresh coffee pulled me in and a large slice of coffee and walnut cake reinforced the pleasure of this welcoming café. I paid my £25.00 admission fee (admittance valid for 12 months) and stepped out into the square. A Union Jack bedecked the pathway leading the way to the entrance hall. No EU flags on display here.

Within the place was an art display by Italian conceptual artist Maurizio Cattelan. There were many strange examples of artwork but the most unusual piece was America. This was located in Churchill's Birth Room and was a golden toilet which was plumbed in ready for use. Three minute time slots were available at the visitor centre to visit this small room. I passed on this invitation. The notice on the door explained this procedure in English, German, Italian, Spanish, French, Chinese and Japanese. Other languages are available.

A number of hours were spent walking around the palace rooms, followed by more time walking around the extensive gardens. A number of souvenirs were purchased before I returned to my guest house late afternoon. I hasten to add I did not return with a golden throne, the reason for this plea of innocence will be made clear later.

I walked the short distance to The Black Prince public house and enjoyed a superb meal of sirloin steak with all the trimmings, washed down by a glass of red wine. After an exhausting but enjoyable day I returned to Hamilton House Guest House to watch the cricket highlights before retiring to bed.

Next morning, being Saturday, I was looking forward to the football match in the afternoon but straight after a hearty breakfast I caught the bus into Oxford City centre. As with lots of towns and cities these days it is so difficult to park and going by bus was the easier option. It was Open Doors weekend in Oxford and this added to the footfall this weekend.

On route to Oxford the bus passed Blenheim Palace and there was a lot of police activity going on within the grounds. I assumed there must be the arrival of a royal visitor or perhaps an important foreign statesman. Extra security I guess. Good job I visited the palace yesterday.

On arrival in Oxford I made my way to the Tourist Information Centre which was incredibly busy. Fortunately service was most efficient and adequate literature was available. Much of the city centre is pedestrianised but some bus routes do compete with the many tourists. The sound of car horns was almost constant as many camera happy tourists stopped in the middle of the road snapping away oblivious to the oncoming traffic.

My original plan had been to visit as many colleges as possible in the little time I had available but I had to change my plans. There was too much to see. I came upon Lincoln College which originally had the name The College of the Blessed Mary and All Saints but I guess you all knew that. It has a long association with Lincoln Cathedral and was founded in 1427 by Richard Fleming, the Bishop of Lincoln. As time was of the essence I left the college for another venue.

A sign for The Covered Market beckoned and I spent an enjoyable time exploring the many stalls. The market was established in 1774 and although busy it was less so than the throngs of tourists in the surrounding streets.

Stepping outside I retraced my steps as I made my way to the John Wesley Methodist Church at the end of the road. This was a lovely small church but with a spacious coffee room at the rear. The stained glass windows were very impressive and the church staff very informative.

I looked at my watch and was surprised at how quickly the time was passing so I started to make my way to the bus station for my bus to Marston. On route the New Theatre stopped me in my tracks. On the board were Aled Jones and Russell Watson, Motown the Musical and many were shows appearing there in the forthcoming weeks. What also caught my eye was Backstage Tours, free entry. I wandered inside and joined a group as we explored the many facets of running a theatre in the modern age. Although an interesting tour, I had to break away before the end as it was time for me to catch a bus to Marston and Oxford City Football Ground. I allowed myself ample time as I wasn't one hundred per cent certain of the actual location. Reaching Marston I found Marsh Lane quite

easily so at least I had found the correct road. Almost there, ten more minutes and I had arrived at the football stadium and met up with fellow supporters. Caroline and David had driven up and arrived half an hour later at 2.30 pm. As kick off time approached there was no sign of our manager and rumours were circulating. At 3.00 pm the match started and within twenty minutes we were goals to the good. That was it as far as we were concerned. Game over. We were wrong as Oxford pulled back the two goals and it finished as a draw.

A hasty exit as I made my way to the bus stop for my journey back to Oxford. Flashing my concessionary bus pass I enjoyed my free bus ride back into the city centre. As I passed the rail station I saw some of our fellow supporters entering for their rail journey home. The bus arrived taking me on to my guest house at Woodstock. As the bus approached the gates of Blenheim Palace scores of police could still be seen in the Palace grounds. I guess the V.I.P.s were still in residence. How wrong could I be?

I alighted at the village of Woodstock and purchased a sandwich to have for my evening meal. Reaching my guest house I went straight to my room after another exhausting day. I turned on the TV and could not believe the shock news. In the early hours of Saturday morning a golden toilet seat has been stolen from Blenheim Palace. The first time palace staff got word of it was when water could be seen flooding into one of the large halls. The golden throne had been cut away from the wall and removed from the palace. It was an almighty shock and in the early police investigations they had nothing to go on. Blenheim Palace had been closed following this incident so I was lucky I visited yesterday.

Next morning my landlady asked if I had heard of the theft from Blenheim Palace of the golden toilet seat. We joked about how it would fit into our present bathrooms but we would never steal a toilet seat as we would have too much to loos.

I did a slight detour off the M40 and visited Cliveden House near Maidenhead. I say visited the house but in fact it was the grounds I visited. The house is now a palatial hotel only open to guests and not the general public. After seeing a few limousines turn up at the house/hotel I made my way back to my car and drove home to Hockley.

It was an exhausting but most enjoyable weekend away that I would recommend to anyone. One thing I ask before I finally sign off. If anyone has any information in regards to the theft of the golden toilet seat, please contact your local police station and relay any information that will lead to the return of this expensive item. It's times like this that I'm glad I went for avocado.



Thursday 19th December - A pre-Christmas get together with mince pies - 2.30 p.m. - at home of Chris and Olive.


